



You know those really cheesy romantic summer blockbusters that have the slogan "one summer can change your life," or something cliché like that? Yeah, well I never bought into that idea, because usually my summers consist of work and Netflix. But this summer was quite different; in fact it could be considered a "life changing" summer.

I was lucky enough to have interned in Colombia this summer with my best friend,
Nere! We were both able to fund our trip
thanks to grant funding from the CP&R office.



For four weeks, we were teacher's assistants, workshop coordinators, and the token Mexican taco makers at a foundation called "Mi Casa en Ipauratu." The foundation brings much needed help to the children with disabilities of a rural area of Colombia. The foundation provides a special education for the children, as well as tries to provide as much additional aid as they can. During our stay, la fundacion was able to raise enough money to help provide one child with a wheelchair so that his mother didn't have to carry him whenever he left his house. And the place runs on donations!

The work I did at the foundation was so incredibly fulfilling and helped me realize I had a true passion for teaching. However, getting to Colombia was not easy. Not only did it take 22


